For this month's article I decided to remind people of Christ's words after his trial. These words are a good reminder to spend time thinking about what these words mean for us. Below are my comments.

1. "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do." Luke 23:34 ESV

This statement shows Christ's compassion toward those who were executing his sentence. Jesus could have called down a legion of angels to destroy his condemners, but He chose forgiveness and in turn teaches us to forgive. This statement would have also impressed the Roman soldiers. They weren't impressed by the Jewish culture of that time. But this man, showing mercy as he is on his way to the gallows, meant he was facing death bravely. Bravery was one of the few things Romans soldiers did respect. The soldiers would have also noted that Jesus was an innocent man. They would have heard Pilate's efforts to try to free Him. Maybe this is why the Centurion said, "Surely this man was the Son of God."

2. "Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise." Luke 23:43 ESV

These are words, Jesus spoke to the condemned criminal hanging by his side. It is never too late to believe in Jesus as Lord and Savior. He can save us even as we breathe our last breath. I have used these words to comfort the bereaved. Knowing that their loved one is in paradise with the Lord Jesus gives them a hope not found anywhere else on earth.

3. "Woman behold your son." John 19:26 ESV

Jesus on the cross showed his concern for his earthly mother. He knew the prophecy, concerning her had come true. Remember when Simeon blessed Mary and said, "a sword will pierce through your own soul also." It was referring to her pain when she watched Jesus die on the cross. Jesus understood the emotional pain his mother was going through as she watched him hang on that tree. Jesus put aside his pain and ministered to her and those in distress around him. In doing so he teaches us to put other's needs ahead of our own needs.

4. "My God, my God, why have you forsaken Me?" Matthew 27:46 ESV

Jesus is quoting Psalm 22:1 as He hung on the cross. Psalm 22 is a poem of King David that describes the crucifixion of Jesus, his future

descendant. Amazing how something written 1,000 years before Jesus was born could accurately predict Jesus' death. I think at this point, in the crucifixion, Jesus is feeling the sins of the world on His shoulders. His Father, the Creator of the world is letting his Son die, when He has the power that could have prevented the execution. Jesus knows the only way to win back the authority given to Satan in Genesis is to make himself the sacrifice. This he does willingly.

5. "I Thirst." John 19:28 ESV

For those who were crucified, it was normal to be thirsty. The loss of blood and the time spent in the sun would have all contributed to His pain of thirst. Jesus who told the woman at the well, "Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks of the water that I will give him will never be thirsty again. The water that I will give him will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life." Ironic how Jesus thirsts and yet he provides "a spring of water welling up to eternal life to those who believe He is the Messiah"!

6. "It is finished." John 19:30 ESV

Jesus' mission on earth has been completed! His mission is to be the sacrifice (die on a cross) for the sins of the people. Three times Jesus predicted his upcoming death to His disciples. Each time Jesus was rebuked or not understood. It was not until after His resurrection, did they begin to understand His mission. "It is finished" is good news to us today! It means we no longer must have sacrificial animals to have our sins forgiven. We simply need to confess our sins and ask Jesus for forgiveness. When we do, we receive His absolution.

7. "Father, into your hands I commit my spirit." Luke 23:46 ESV

Luke records that when Jesus uttered these words, He breathed His last breath. This was followed by a pagan Roman Centurion who said "Certainly this man was innocent." Even the crowds who watched the killing knew that Jesus was blameless because Luke records "they went home beating their breasts." The promise here is that for those who believe in Christ, upon their earthly death they can be assured that we will be with the Lord.

Cotta Guild supports mission projects near and far through the collection of our Mites for Mission donations. These mission projects are voted on at our Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) national and district conventions by the delegates. Thank you for your support of our Mites for Missions on the second Sunday of each month. Your donations may be placed in the mites' boxes located at the church entrances. The following mission project has our mites for missions at work in Dallas, TX.

2021–2023 Mission Grant #15 "The Littlest and Least of These, Dallas, Texas — St. Paul Lutheran Church and Christian Academy" \$42,000

Serving the Littlest and the Least of These: By Jean Addison, Director of St. Paul Christian Academy with Eden Keefe.

When contemplating what Scripture reference to use in correlation with our LWML Mission Grant, "The Littlest and Least of These," and our project's focus, Matthew 25:40 came to mind.

“And the King will answer them, ‘Truly I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did to me.’” In this case, I wanted to personalize it for the families we serve at our childcare center — the children, who are the “littlest,” and the low-income families, who are the “least.”

Prior to Hurricane Katrina in 2005, Reverend Byron R. Williams, Sr., shared his vision with our congregation, Trinity Lutheran Church in New Orleans, Louisiana, to establish a daycare. Fast-forward to 2006, he echoed that same vision with our congregation, St. Paul Lutheran Church in Dallas, Texas. Overcoming many obstacles, that vision became a reality in August of 2019 when we opened the doors of St. Paul Christian Academy: a full-time childcare center for children six weeks–four years old and before and after school care for K–5th graders.

With God’s blessings and many prayers, enrollment increased from three to 55 children within four months. With that growth, the need to provide transportation, additional space for parent trainings, as well as to hold food, clothing, and school supply drives became apparent. St. Paul Lutheran Church and Christian Academy answered its call to become a mission ministry for our low-income, unchurched, childcare families, as well as to the elderly, the local school, and the community.

During our ribbon-cutting ceremony, God placed an angel in our midst, Christine Weerts, Editor of the *Black Lutheran Ministry Timeline Newsletter*, who provided a wealth of information regarding available grants and resources that would support our improvement and expansion efforts. With her guidance, we applied for an LWML Texas District mission grant. We received \$20,000 to purchase a van which we use to provide children transportation to and from school, as well as transportation for families to attend worship service and church/childcare activities.

As a recipient of a \$42,000 LWML Mission Grant, “The Littlest and Least of These,” we completed needed repairs, renovations, and updates to our Fellowship Hall and kitchen. There is now adequate space and updated equipment/ appliances for childcare and fellowship meals, bi-weekly worship services, special services/ministry events, training classes, and physical activities when weather prevents outdoor play. Our childcare families, church, and community have been impacted by this building improvement tremendously!

Thank you, wonderful women of LWML, for supporting our mission ministries through your mission outreach as we reach those in need of God’s Word while expanding His Kingdom!

Jean Addison served as a 20-year educator in the New Orleans Public Schools before relocating to Dallas, Texas, following Hurricane Katrina. She then served 15 years in the Dallas Independent School District before assuming the role as childcare director at St. Paul Christian Academy.

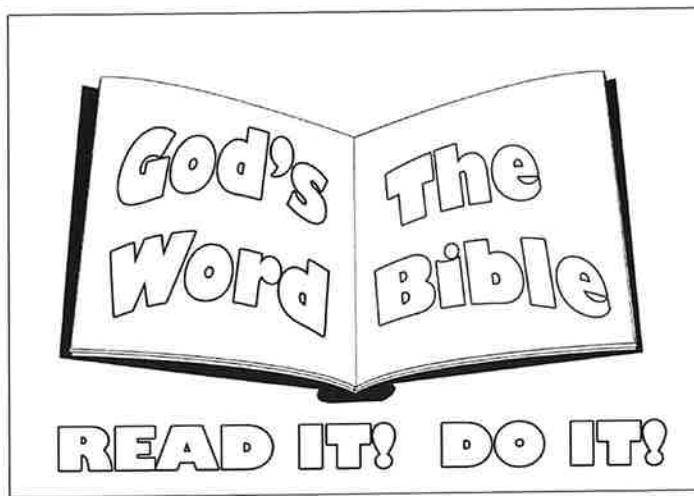

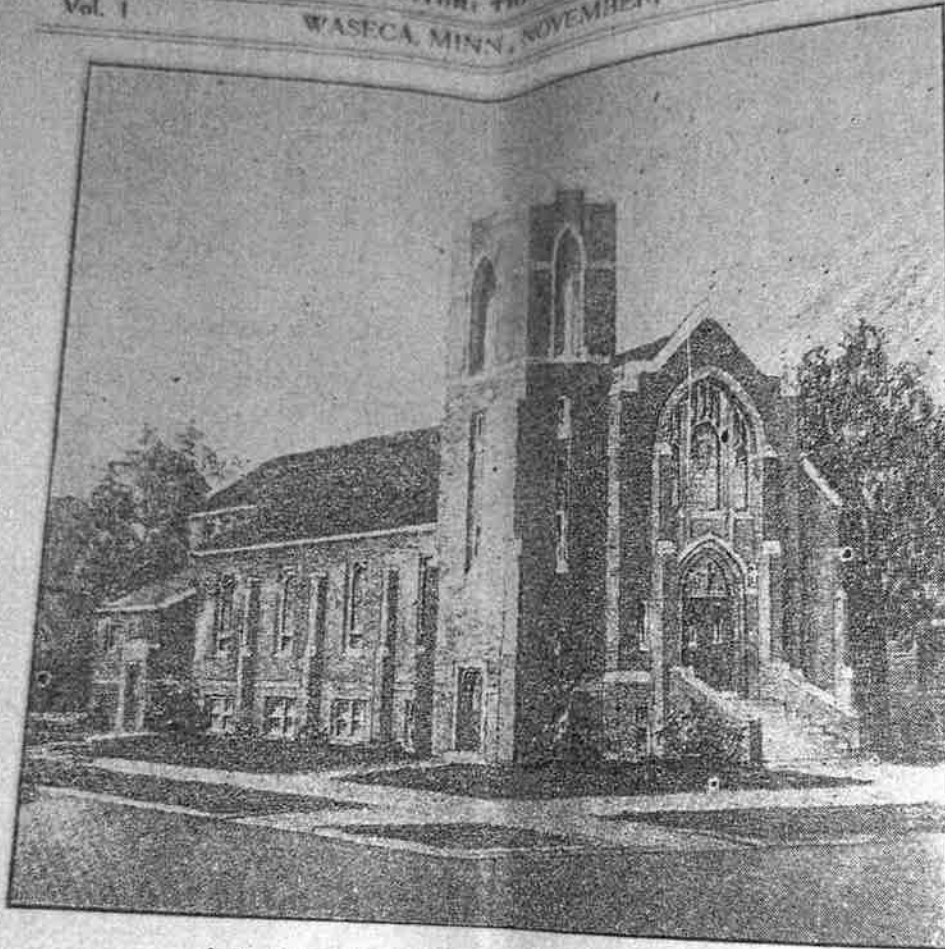
