

One of the greatest Bible stories is Jesus' trek to the cross. According to the apostle Luke, there are three sub stories within the journey.

The first is when the soldiers seized a man called Simon of Cyrene. This event probably indicates the physical condition of Jesus was poor. Jesus had been beaten and whipped, at the same time he hadn't eaten or drank anything. He must have been close to fainting from the loss of blood. The fact Simon was chosen to carry His cross was probably a common practice. Those who were sent to the cross were almost always in a state of collapsing. I am sure Simon probably had no idea that he carried the Messiah's cross.

The second story shows Jesus speaking to the women who had followed Him during his ministry. St. Luke records in verse 23:28: "Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me, but weep for yourselves and for your children. For behold, the days are coming when they will say, blessed are the barren and the wombs that never bore and the breasts that never nursed! Then they will begin to say to the mountains, fall on us,' and to the hills, 'Cover us. For if they do these things when the wood is green, what will happen when it is dry?"

This statement is actually a warning to the people watching and to us. Jesus is the green wood, and we are the dry wood. This reminds me of the statement "If life got better the further you moved from Jesus, you should be worried; I'm not worried!"

America is currently suffering from being very dry wood. As a nation we have chosen to move away from Jesus. We seldom attend church, we prefer to curse his name, we would rather attend sporting events than Bible study.

However, I think the greatest sin of our nation is turning our backs and allowing the abortion industry to operate at full steam. Jesus warns us that we are to suffer the little children. He also says in Matthew 18:10, a child's angel has face time directly with God. "See that you do not despise one of these little ones. For I tell you that in heaven their angels always see the face of my Father who is in heaven." And Matthew 18: tells us: "whoever causes one of these little ones who believe in me to sin, it would be better for him to have a great millstone fastened around his neck and to be drowned in the depth of the sea." Jesus loves children and he does not like us to hurt them in any way. Coming from the Lord of the universe, we should take note.

The third story, is the story of when Jesus turns and speaks to the crowd with these words from Matthew 23:34 "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do." Wow, this is a phrase that no human could utter. Jesus was able to forgive those who were going to kill him in just a few hours. Jesus had two choices at that point. He could call down angels to save him, kill his oppressors and restore him to power. Or he could forgive those who were about to kill him. He chose the latter.

This statement proves Jesus is God. This statement proves Jesus is obedient to God the Father. This statement shows that Jesus did what Adam could not do. Because Jesus did God's will, while Adam rejected God's will.

These statements are examples of what we should do when our enemies surround us. We are to forgive them and put them in Jesus hands.




BIBLE READING SCHEDULE

Cotta Guild supports mission projects through the Mites for Mission donations. The mission projects

are voted on at our Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) national and district conventions by the delegates. Thank you for your support of these mission projects. Your donations may be placed in the Mites for Missions' boxes located at the church entrances on the second Sunday of each month.

Jesus said to her, "Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks of the water that I will give him will never be thirsty again. The water that I will give him will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life" (John 4:13-14).

My mite box sits on my kitchen windowsill directly above the sink. Sometimes as I stand and fill a glass or a pot with water (often for my morning coffee!), I glance at it and have fleeting thoughts of doubt: Do a few coins really make a difference for Christ and His Church? But as someone who prays regularly for ways to assist with "the great task of bringing the lost and the erring into eternal fellowship with Him," I know better.

The short answer is, "of course," a few coins really make a difference. How do I know? In my role, I get to correspond regularly with many of our mission grant recipients. These emails and letters serve as constant reminders, such as the newsletters from Pastor David Baker, who receives direct support through our grant to Mission Central in Iowa (Mission Grant #4: LCMS Missionary Support – Running the Race Together).

Pastor Baker and his family currently serve as missionaries to the Muslimbackground ethnic Kazakh people in Western Mongolia. Since his two-year vicarage in Kazakhstan nearly twenty years ago, he and his family have spent most of their lives in Central Asia. (Fun fact: Pastor Baker recently shared with me that his wife Rachel's grandmother, Laverne Selle, was at the first ever LWML rally and was a president for some time of the LWML South Wisconsin District. What a legacy of "hands to work for Him" and "feet to go on His errands.") In his most recent newsletter, Pastor Baker writes: "One of our main goals in moving out to Western Mongolia is to disciple and catechize families, helping them to be grounded in the faith and to grow in Christ. Over the last couple of months, we have finally started gaining some traction with over 30 members meeting in five small groups to study the basics of the Christian faith." He goes on to discuss some of the challenges of ministry among the nomadic people: "These are the ones who tend to have the least ongoing contact with the church and need further instruction and discipleship the most." He asks for our prayers "for the growth among the families in confirmation, both in true knowledge and Christian life," and "for key people to commit to the classes in the outlying nomadic communities. Without someone taking responsibility in each of these far-flung communities, it becomes almost impossible to regularly find and meet with the scattered Christians."

When I see my mite box on the kitchen windowsill, instead of allowing my mind to doubt, I can turn in prayer to the God of the universe, who alone can find a way to connect my coins with nomadic Kazakh workers, lost and in need of the good news of a Savior who died and rose to grant them the gifts of forgiveness and eternal life. As the water flows from my faucet, I can be reminded of the life-giving water poured out at my Baptism, giving me faith in Christ by the power of His Word. I can give thanks for the Baker family and ask the Lord to bless them in their work with His peace, wisdom, and strength for the tasks they face. I know that because God faithfully hears and answers prayer, He will continue to use me, and the Bakers, and each one of you, to spread the news of His life-giving water around the world, through your mites and in countless other ways!




