Greetings in the name of Jesus,

I'm sure it has not gone unnoticed that I "do things differently" than some of St. Paul's previous pastors. Indeed, I am still adjusting and seeking to understand some of the reasons you do things the way you do as well. As situations and questions arise, and as I pray, read Scripture and seek godly counsel, my desire is that God would use me to guide all of us in unity of faith, by the power of the Spirit and clarity of God's Word. It will be a lifelong learning and growing process for all of us, I'm sure. It is important that in all things we are intentional, and do things to the best of our ability, seeking above all to honor and glorify God, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

One of the things that deserves our attention is our belief and practice regarding Holy Communion. Among those who proclaim Christ, there are many different beliefs and practices regarding Holy Communion. However, our church body (The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod) has a clear confession regarding what it is, and who should receive it. And let me be clear – we want to see everybody coming to the Lord's Table. However, as a servant of Christ, and a steward of the mysteries of God, I must answer to God (as must we all). Therefore, it is important that I am intentional about providing our congregation with the right teaching, good understanding, and proper practice with regard to Holy Communion.

In this spirit, this will be the first in a series of articles on the subject of Holy Communion. In this article I will focus on what the Scriptures teach us about holy things and some specifics about holy meals. Then I will draw some connections to our belief and practice surrounding Holy Communion.

In the Old Testament times many things were consecrated (made to be holy). The vessels, utensils, dishes, curtains, altars...everything in the temple was holy. But they had not always been holy. At one point they were common things. They were gathered by common people, worked into their form by common workers (metal workers and wood-workers, weavers and seamstresses). But when they were finished with their work, they brought them to the priests, whom were given the responsibility of consecrating those items according to the instructions of God.

Our church building is a holy place. It was consecrated when it was first built. Many (if not all) of the items used to praise and worship of God were consecrated. Everything from the pipe organ to the altar linens, banners and vestments have been consecrated. Because of this there are special considerations and procedures for disposing of them when they get worn out or need to be replaced. The worn out vestments and linens are to be burned. Their ashes are to be spread over the ground in a designated, consecrated spot. In and of themselves, they are no more special than a similar common item that serves a similar common function (like a tablecloth or wall hanging in your home). But by virtue of their consecration, they are holy and we treat them as such.

In the Old Testament there are different consecrating ceremonies. Most of them include washing with water, animal sacrifice, the sprinkling of the blood of the sacrifice on the temple items (or

on the people) and the consuming of the flesh of that sacrifice (by eating and/or by fire). When the priests were done with consecrating the items, these once common things were no longer common – they were holy. As such they were not to be used in a common way. They had been set apart for God’s purposes according to His instructions. The sacrifice used to consecrate the item was also holy, and there were rules concerning the proper consumption of the sacrifice (who could eat it, when should it be eaten, where should it be eaten, etc.)

These holy sacrifices, became holy meals. One such sacrifice was the Passover lamb. Its blood was not smeared inside the temple but on the doorposts of the house (marking the house as set apart...holy unto the LORD). Only certain people were admitted to the Passover meal (those identified by the covenant as God’s chosen). And the meal was holy. It was to be fully consumed that night. None of it was to be left for the morning. If there were any leftovers, they were to be burnt to ashes (Exodus 12:10).

The same instructions are given regarding the meat and the bread of ordination in Exodus 29:33-34:

They shall eat those things with which atonement was made at their ordination and consecration, but an outsider shall not eat of them, because they are holy. And if any of the flesh for the ordination or of the bread remain until the morning, then you shall burn the remainder with fire. It shall not be eaten, because it is holy.

This brings us to Holy Communion – the holy meal that Christ gives us. We are told that everything in the Old Testament points to Christ, and is for our benefit. We are also told that the holy sacrifices and holy places (even the holy priesthood and covenant) were simply a copy and shadow of what we receive in Christ. In light of the instruction given above regarding the Passover lamb and the ordination meal, what is the most appropriate practice regarding any leftover consecrated bread and wine from Holy Communion? Should we not also take care to consume it all on the day it is consecrated, or dispose of it in a way that honors its consecration (its holiness)? And how much more since we are not talking about the body and blood of a sheep or bull (the shadow), but the body and blood of Christ, the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world (the substance).

The Elders, Cotta Guild can all tell you that there is a small patch of designated (holy) ground where any consecrated wine may be poured if it is not fully consumed during Holy Communion. In like manner, any remaining consecrated bread that is not consumed during communion is set apart so that it may be brought to the sick and shut-in members of the congregation who Pastor meets with during the week.

However, in keeping with what God commanded regarding the shadow sacrifices of the Old Testament, I am convinced that the most fitting practice would be to fully consume, or respectfully and appropriately dispose of these remaining holy elements during or immediately after the meal. After all, according to Christ’s Word we are not simply handling consecrated bread and wine, but Christ’s very body and blood, which He has given to us for the forgiveness of sins, and the strengthening of our faith. How we handle these elements both during and after the meal should reflect our faith in this truth. This is clearly discussed in a handy Concordia Publishing House (CPH) resource titled The Altar Guild Manual.

Finally, while we discuss holy things it should be noted that we are holy. We have been consecrated in our baptism. We have been set apart for God’s purposes. By our baptism into Jesus’ once-for-all sacrifice, we are sprinkled with His blood. As we read in Hebrews 9:13-14:

For if the blood of goats and bulls, and the sprinkling of defiled persons with the ashes of a heifer, sanctify for the purification of the flesh, how much more will the blood of

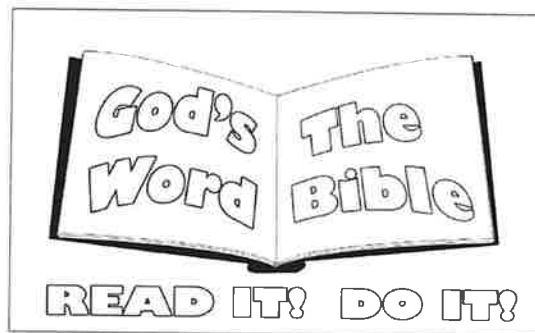
Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without blemish to God, purify our conscience from dead works to serve the living God.

God has made us holy in Christ so that we might live uncommon, holy lives. Whatever your vocation, age or station in life, by virtue of your Baptism into Christ you are holy. You have been purified by His sacrifice and through faith in His name, so that you may live free from the guilt of sin; free from the fear of God's judgement. By His obedience unto death we have been freed from death, so that we might live in accordance with God's will and purpose in our lives. Live that uncommon, set apart, holy life through the blood of the Lamb. Come joyfully to Christ's table to receive the holy meal of His body and blood for the forgiveness of your sins, trusting in His true presence and sure promise. Amen.

Next month we will explore more in depth how God's Word enlightens us regarding the shadow of the old covenant compared with the substance we have in Christ. Until then...

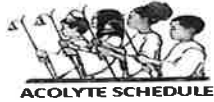


Bible Reading Schedule

Mites for Missions:

Our Cotta Guild supports missions near and far through the collection of our Mites for Missions donations. These mission projects are voted on at our Lutheran Women's Missionary League national and district conventions by the delegates. Thank you for your support of our Mites for Missions on the second Sunday of each month. Your donations may be placed in the mite boxes located at the church entrances. Your donations help share God's Word with those who have not heard it.

At the LWML Convention in June in Milwaukee, Lutheran Hour Ministries received two of the 31 mission grants approved by the LWML for the 2023-2025 biennium, "Sharing Christ to Women and Children in Kazakhstan" and "Expanding Gospel Outreach to Hispanics--U.S." Each grant was approved for \$100,000 as part of the \$2.35 million mission goal adopted by the LWML voting body.

The primary focus for the grant, "Sharing Christ to Women and Children in Kazakhstan" is to work through churches in the region to share God's love with wives, mothers and their children, families and youth, and people of the region, including those in remote areas. Through a variety of digital platforms and materials and through children and youth programs, people will be able to hear the Word of God in their language, strengthening and encouraging them in the faith.

The primary focus for the grant, "Expanding Gospel Outreach to Hispanics--U.S." is to reach those who identify as Hispanic in the United States and who speak Spanish primarily. One in five people in the U. S. is Hispanic; by 2060, it is expected that Hispanics will constitute more than 27 percent of the American population. There are extremely limited Hispanic Lutheran Christian resources today supporting the church at large for Hispanics. The grant will help share the Gospel with Hispanic families, Latino communities, and the Hispanic population. Lutheran Hour Ministries can reach the Latino population in the U. S. with a Christ-centered message that applies to daily life in American culture and will give them the opportunity to hear God's message of salvation in Spanish, strengthening and encouraging them in the faith. It's a blessing to share the Gospel with those who haven't heard it.

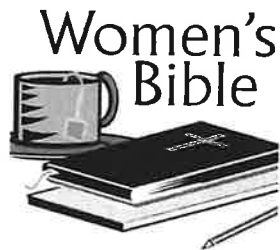

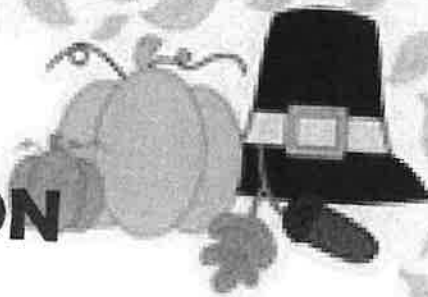

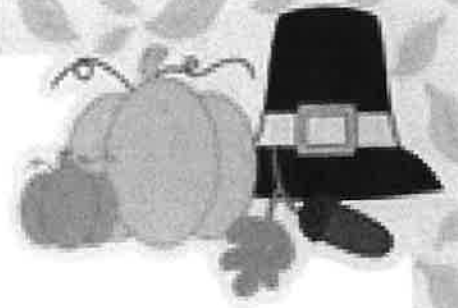
