Holy Communion: Shadows and Presence

Greetings in the name of Jesus Christ, God with us,

Last month I said I would be writing a series of articles on Holy Communion. So as promised, here is my second article in the series. In Hebrews chapters 7-10 we are given a very detailed teaching regarding the fact that the Old Testament rituals and holy items were but a shadow of the true and heavenly holy things. We learn from Hebrews that the seemingly endless, perpetual sacrifices of the Old Testament all pointed to Jesus, the once-for-all sacrifice (the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world). The old covenant was a shadow of the better covenant that came through Christ (and is still coming to us today).

According to Christ's words, in Holy Communion we are receiving the once-forall sacrifice of His body and blood for our forgiveness. *He* is the substance of that which was foreshadowed. If the shadow items and rituals were to be regarded as holy, and misuse of them brought about condemnation and even death, how much more should we be careful to regard the holy elements that bring us not the shadow, but the very *substance* of Christ?

We believe, teach and confess that in this simple, but holy meal (consisting of bread and wine), we are receiving exactly what Christ says: "Take eat; this is My body...Drink of it, all of you, for this is My blood of the covenant which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins." After reminding the Corinthian church of Christ's words above, the Apostle Paul says the following regarding the Sacrament:

Whoever, therefore, eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be guilty concerning the body and blood of the Lord. Let a person examine himself, then, and so eat of the bread and drink of the cup. For anyone who eats and drinks without discerning the body eats and drinks judgment on himself. That is why many of you are weak and ill, and some have died. But if we judged ourselves truly, we would not be judged [by God]. But when we are judged by the Lord, we are disciplined so that we may not be condemned along with the world. (1Co 11:27-32)

Christ's own words should be enough to give us the unwavering confession that in the bread and the wine we are actually also receiving His body, and His blood; which He sacrificed on the Cross once for all for the forgiveness of our sins. In remembering what He has done for us, and by trusting in His worthy sacrifice, we also receive the forgiveness of sins, life and salvation (the fruits of His sacrifice). Jesus instituted The Sacrament (meaning His "holy oath") for our blessing and good. By receiving Communion often, we are centered in the core belief of our faith; that Christ sacrificed Himself for the forgiveness of our sins, and offers that

forgiveness to each one of us through faith in Him.

But if Christ's own words aren't enough to convince us of the fact that the physical elements of bread and wine house the presence of His body given and blood shed for us, then St. Paul's words above to the Corinthians should convince us of the fact that this is not simply a symbolic gesture or memorial meal. Those who ate and drank without discerning the body of Christ in the meal were eating and drinking judgement upon themselves. They were getting ill and some were even dying as a result of their casual regard for this holy meal.

In Communion, it is not the faith of the individual that makes it the body and blood of Christ. It is the Word of Christ Himself that accomplishes this mystery, and which compels and invites us to believe and receive what He offers to us in the meal. It is not the quality of the bread and wine that makes it special, it is the fact that it has been consecrated – set apart – using Christ's own words to deliver to each faith-filled participant His very body and blood *for our forgiveness*.

Those who do not discern the body of Christ in the meal also truly receive the body and blood of Christ in the bread and wine. But as St. Paul said, it is to their judgement. Luther confirms the presence of Christ in the physical elements of the sacrament in this way: "No matter whether you are unworthy or worthy, you here have Christ's body and blood by virtue of these words (i.e. Christ's words) which are coupled with the bread and wine."

In this meal, the consecration of the elements using the words of institution means something. It means that this is no longer simply bread and wine. Yes, it has been made holy (set apart) in that moment of consecration connecting all the way back to Christ's institution of the Sacrament. But even more than being just another holy thing – more than simply being a shadow of Christ's holiness – the very substance of Christ and His holiness is present in the bread and wine according to His own words.

Therefore, in the Sacrament we can truly say we are in the presence of Immanuel (God with us). What was once common bread and wine, by the power of the Divine Word, is now also a physical manifestation of Christ Himself. That is why it delivers the forgiveness of sins to those who believe...and that is why it delivers God's judgment to those who do not believe. But regardless of one's faith, Christ's Word and presence is true. We don't participate in a shadow but the substance of Christ, and the truth of His forgiveness. Amen.

Our Cotta Guild supports missions near and far through the collection of our Mites for Missions donations. These mission projects are voted on at our Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) national and district conventions by the delegates. Thank you for your support of our Mites for Missions on the second Sunday of each month. Your donations may be placed in the mite boxes located at the church entrances.

A gap in spiritual care on the Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch's Bismarck campus has been a chapel facility specifically designed to be a healing space for traumatized boys and girls. A construction date of spring 2024 has been set to build a chapel to serve as a healing space to help them know and experience the mercy of Christ and His healing power. This grant will help meet the construction costs of the Chapel on the Bismarck campus and provide healing for at-risk children.

A Special Chapel — Offering Hope and Healing for At-Risk Children

The Christ-centered, healing ministry of Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch creates an eternal, life-giving impact in the lives of children ages 10 to 18, who have faced heartbreaking abuse, neglect, and trauma. Established in 1952, the Ranch touches the lives of more than 2,000 children and families each year, from all corners of the United States. The childhood trauma these children faced leaves them with debilitating emptiness and loneliness. Most children who come to the Ranch have little or no faith background and the Ranch is often the first place they learn about Jesus. The discovery of our Savior's mercy is often the most vital part of a child's healing.

The Ranch's Bismarck, North Dakota, campus was built in 2003. Since then, programming for the campus' children has evolved to be a psychiatric residential treatment facility. The children who now come into care at this campus are survivors of significant trauma. The campus currently includes a gym to care for physical needs, a school to supply educational needs, and therapy rooms to care for psychiatric and sensory needs. To fill a gap in spiritual care, a specialized chapel facility has been designed to be a space where these at-risk children can find hope in the unfailing promises of God. The new chapel will provide a healing space to minister to each child's spiritual needs, where they can find the hope and healing that comes only from Christ.

The Ranch's Board of Directors has worked with architects who specialize in design for traumatized children, as well as liturgical experts, specializing in facilities that embody the Gospel. The resulting chapel will be a 3,175 square foot addition to the campus' main building, providing a space for the spiritual needs of Ranch children and staff. This mission grant of \$100,000 will help with building costs of the new chapel, where the hearts of these precious children can know and experience the mercy of Christ and His healing power.

The Neighborhood Service Center, which includes the Food Shelf, is feeding more families than ever from the food shelf. On average about 20 families a day are coming in for food. The most needed items are cereal, ramen noodles and comfort foods like soups and pasta plus sauce. The Board of Stewardship has placed collection boxes by the church entries for your donation to those individuals needing our support. If you prefer to make a cash donation, please make checks payable to Neighborhood Service Center and mark your church envelope appropriately or drop off your cash donation at the church office. A receipt will be sent to you at the end of the year by the Neighborhood Service Center.

Are you in need of transportation to appointments or to the store? Are you able to drive someone to an appointment or to the store?? If you fit into either of these categories, please call the church office so, we can help you coordinate the rides that you may need.


