Greetings in Christ,

In my first article on Holy Communion 2 months ago, I stated that the Lutheran Church has clear teachings regarding what the Eucharist is, (the true body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ, under the Bread and wine) and who should be admitted to it (those who desire the forgiveness of sins offered therein). I also stated that the earnest desire of the Church is that all would come and rightly receive the blessings of this Sacrament. However, it is my responsibility as the Pastor of St. Paul to both welcome certain people and refuse admission to others based on certain criteria. So, what are those criteria? Well, they fall under three general categories of worthy reception. Those categories are: preparedness; confession; and repentance.

Preparedness first and foremost has to do with whether or not a person is a baptized member of the Church (universal). But along with being a baptized child of God, there are other forms of preparation that we deem important for one to be admitted. St. Paul says in I Corinthians 11:27 and following that a person should not receive communion in an unworthy manner. He says that part of being worthy has to do with participants examining themselves. The other part of being worthy has to do with discerning the body and blood present in the bread and wine. Luther says the person is worthy and well prepared who believes the Words of Christ, "given for you" and "shed for you."

With regard to self-examination we understand this to mean that we should come to the table considering our sins, and seeking God's forgiveness, which He offers to us freely in this holy meal. Discerning the body and blood means that one ought to realize that this is not just some symbolic practice. Rather, according to Jesus' own words, the bread and wine we receive are in fact also His body and blood, through which we are offered the forgiveness of sins (and the fruits of that forgiveness – resurrection unto life eternal).

The second criterion for worthy reception has to do with whether or not a person believes what the Church confesses. The basic question at hand is, "Do you believe what we teach concerning the Christian faith in general, and regarding the Sacrament specifically?" In the Lutheran tradition we have *usually* tied those preparedness and confession sections to Confirmation. However, some choose to administer first Communion earlier in childhood, before a formal Confirmation has been completed. This was the practice at the congregation I most recently served. It was the responsibility of the parent and the child (or the individual adult) to learn the parts of the catechism and to be able to discuss them at an age appropriate level with me before being admitted to the Lord's Supper.

On a practical note, I have shared in Bible study and in other discussions that as important as Confirmation is in terms of faith formation, it need not be the benchmark for admission to the Lord's Supper. Can a baptized child believe in

Christ's body and blood being truly yet mysteriously present in the bread and the wine? Can a baptized child memorize the six chief parts of Luther's Small Catechism and have a good basic understanding of them? Can a baptized child understand his or her need for forgiveness, and long to receive it through the Sacrament? Certainly.

Growing in our knowledge of Scripture and of our faith is a life-long process that we will never complete. However, faith-filled children who have been nurtured in the Church often express a desire to receive exactly what is being offered at the Lord's Table (the forgiveness of sins through the body and blood of Christ). I for one am happy to admit them to Holy Communion with their fellow Kingdom workers if I am convinced of three things: that they have a good basic belief in and understanding of the faith as expressed in Luther's Small Catechism, that they can and will examine themselves, and that they have expressed to me their desire to live a life of daily repentance.

Which leads us to the final category regarding ones worthiness for reception of the meal: Repentance. It is one thing to know and believe what is being offered (forgiveness through Christ's once for all sacrifice). It is another thing to demonstrate honor and respect toward it by seeking to live a life in keeping with repentance.

If I know I am sinning in a certain area of my life, and I seek God's forgiveness, but keep on willfully sinning, then I am not seeking to honor God with my life. Rather, I am intentionally taking God's grace for granted, and have not actually repented. In effect I have said, "God, I know this is against Your will, but I want You to turn a blind eye to this so that I can keep on doing it." This is <u>not</u> seeking God's forgiveness of sins; rather it is seeking God's <u>permission</u> to sin. God doesn't ever grant us permission to sin.

As your Pastor I am called proclaim the Gospel of forgiveness through Christ to all. But I am also called to bind the sins of the unrepentant, withholding the Word of forgiveness from those who have demonstrated that they are not actually interested in receiving it. Therefore, I am not supposed to admit those who are unrepentant – those who knowingly live contrary to God's will. The one who receives the Sacrament unworthily still receives Christ's body and blood, only it is not to their benefit, but to their harm. As your Pastor it is my responsibility to administer the Lord's Supper to those who will receive the blessing of forgiveness by faith, and to protect those who would be harmed through faithless, or an unrepentant unworthy reception.

So, who is worthy to receive the Sacrament? The baptized child of God, who trusts in the grace of God being offered through the body and blood of Christ present in the meal, *and* who strives to live a life in repentance through that forgiveness of sins.

Young or old, I encourage all of you to use Luther's Small Catechism in your daily prayers and devotions. Grow in the truth of Scripture. You are never too young or too old to learn and grow in the knowledge and faith. If you have questions regarding the Sacrament of the Altar, or how to use the Catechism in your personal or family daily devotional life please set up an appointment with me. I am happy to help.

Community-wide collections at St. Paul's accepted a total of 730shoeboxes, which were then taken by trailer to Mankato. Thank you to the many volunteers who greeted individuals that brought their shoeboxes to St. Paul's, loaded the trailer, and safely transported all those boxes. From Mankato, all were taken to a Minneapolis warehouse for final customs check before shipping out from MSP airport.

St. Paul's purchased shipping labels through the Shoebox website for tracking. This year, our boxes were sent to the South American country of Paraguay. Please pray - for the workers delivering the boxes and for the children in Paraguay receiving the shoeboxes and others around the world. After receiving a box, each child is invited to attend Bible study in their community. We pray the Holy Spirit uses these gifts of love in amazing ways to share the salvation found only in Jesus.

Next year, boxes will continue to be available for you to take home, fill, and return with shipping funds of \$10 per box. You are welcome to use items from the Shoebox storage room to complete your box. And we will pack boxes in November, ahead of the National Packing Week.

Families choose Journeys Lutheran School for a variety of reasons, including emotional and spiritual growth, a Christian worldview, an educational approach that works best for their unique student, or a more therapeutic approach to education. We are all God's children despite our differences, challenges, or experiences. Journeys Lutheran School prepares students in Grades 3-12 with unique learning challenges to maximize their God-given spiritual, academic, physical, emotional, and social potential. The resources and experience of Journeys provides academic help to students and provides an opportunity for their lives to be touched by the Holy Spirit through devotions, prayer, Christian counseling, religion classes, and personal witness. Grant funds will purchase two 15-passenger vans. The vans will allow Journeys to reach and teach more students and meet their academic and spiritual needs. In addition to the school bus already in use, the vans will provide alternative means to reach students in areas outside of Milwaukee. Additionally, the vans will transport youth to Martin Luther High School, a ministry partner, so that Journeys students can take elective classes in a Christian mainstream environment. This will enable Journeys students to earn a high school diploma, not just a certificate of completion. The vans will also transport students to potential school-to-work internship opportunities and to transport students to cultural, historical, and spiritual learning experiences without needing to use the full-size school bus. Journeys children deserve the same educational and spiritual opportunities that other children enjoy. The van will help them experience the fullness of God's creation by opening the world and all its possibilities and opportunities to them.
