Greetings in the name of the Father and of the H Son and of the Holy Spirit, I have been asked, "Pastor, is it proper for Lutherans to make the sign of the cross in worship and in their daily lives?" Many in the Western world think of making the sign of the cross as being a "Roman Catholic thing" and therefore not something that "Protestants" do. However, this sentiment comes from a mixed understanding of what it means to be "Protestant." The truth of the matter is that making the sign of the cross upon oneself has been a practice of Christians going so far back (at least since the 100s) that this tradition is practiced both in the Western Church (Catholic) and Eastern Church (Orthodox).

Luther was a firm advocate of making the sign of the cross. He included it in the catechism as the way we should begin and end our day. He mentions making the sign of the cross in many of his writings as a way to ward off the devil, since it can be a clear sign that you trust in Christ. In fact, making the sing of the cross is a distinctly Christian act. Members of false religions around the world fold their hands, bow their heads, close their eyes and use other such motions of piety in their worship life, but only Christians make the sign of the cross. Indeed, making the sign of the cross is part of the historic practice of the whole Christian Church. When the candidate for Baptism comes to the font, the instruction in the service says, "The pastor makes the sign of the holy cross upon the forehead and heart of each candidate while saying: Name, receive the sign of the holy cross both upon your forehead and upon your heart to mark you as one redeemed by Christ the crucified." Thus, even before Baptism, at our entry into the Christian community, we were marked with the cross. Why is that? Because it was by the death of Christ on the cross that we have the Gospel of forgiveness and the promise of redemption from death and hell!

St. Paul says in Romans, "Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into His death?... We know that our old self was crucified with Him in order that the body of sin might be brought to nothing, so that we would no longer be enslaved to sin (Rom. 6:3ff). Furthermore, Paul writes in Galatians, "I have been crucified with Christ. It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me. And the life I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me" (Gal. 2:20). And all who are baptized also receive our Lord's instructions, "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me" (Matt. 16:24). So not only are we redeemed by Christ the crucified, but we live the way of the cross. Interestingly, at the beginning of the funeral service the casket is covered with a pall, a white garment most often adorned with a cross. The pastor speaks the words, "In Holy Baptism <u>name</u> was clothed with the robe of Christ's righteousness that covered all <u>his/her</u> sin." The mark of the cross first made on the body at Holy Baptism now becomes a covering of the cross and Christ's righteousness,

indicating that the body of the believer will be raised to the fullness of redemption. In all of the Divine Service settings of Lutheran Service Book the instruction at the Invocation is this: "The sign of the cross may be made by all in remembrance of their Baptism." The cross is made when we hear the name of God, which was first spoken over and given to us in Holy Baptism: "In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." In other parts of the Divine Service the sign of the cross may also be made by the pastor and the people: the absolution, the Creed, the dismissal from the Lord's Supper, the benediction. We are continually marked!

As far as the mechanics and reason are concerned, the book Lutheranism 101 gives directions: The sign of the cross is made by placing the thumb and first two fingers of the right hand together as a reminder of the Trinity. Touch your head at the naming of the Father; then bring your hand to the middle of your chest (over your heart) at the naming of the Son. At the naming of the Holy Spirit, touch your right shoulder and then your left shoulder...But when the sign of the cross is made, whether by pastor or people, let this be the proclamation: Christ has died for your sins upon the cross; in Baptism He shares that cross with you; because you share in His cross, you are a child of God and are precious in His sight."

Making the sign of the cross is not something anyone should feel forced to do. But some Lutherans have always used this faithful practice, it is encouraged in the Catechism, and it is increasing in use among Lutherans today. I for one think it is a good practice, and encourage our members to make use of this ancient symbol if you find it useful in your life and practice of our faith in Christ.

BIBLE READING SCHEDULE

This Lenten season we see Jesus identify Himself as the God Who revealed Himself as "I AM" to Moses at the burning bush (Exodus 3:14). Jesus identifies Himself in the great "I AM" statements in the gospels. In our Bible reading schedule this month we read one of those "I AM" statements in the Gospel of mark. Jesus is being questioned at His "trial" by the Jewish Sanhedrin. The High Priest asks Jesus if He is the Messiah, the Christ, the Son of God. And Jesus said, "I AM!" (Mark 14:62) The Jewish leaders understood the fact the Jesus had called Himself God, but they didn't believe He was God. So, they wrongly accused Him of blasphemy and sentenced Him to death on the cross. Christ took up the cross for us that by His sufferings, death and resurrection we might be saved, and be able to say, "I am a believer. I am a Christian. I am forgiven and saved in Christ." These mission projects are voted on at our Lutheran Women's Missionary League national and district conventions by the delegates. Your donations help share God's Word. The following mission grants were approved at the LWML National Convention in Milwaukee in June and have been paid.

Disaster Response Team 2023–2025 Mission Grant 5 — \$50,000

Trinity Lutheran Church Disaster Response Team (TLC DRT) in Tyler, Texas, answers the call to serve our neighbors in need by ministering to the physical and spiritual needs of people affected by severe storms such as hurricanes, tornadoes, and floods. The team is comprised totally of volunteer workers who set up base camps in areas that have been affected by natural disasters. They listen compassionately to the stories of people who have been affected by storms and share Christ's love with them in Word and action. TLC DRT's equipment and trailers are also used by volunteers from other teams, causing additional wear

and tear on equipment. This grant will allow repair and replacement of necessary equipment so the team can continue to be Christ's hands and feet and share God's love to people affected by disasters.

Mobile Kitchen 2023-2025 Mission Grant 6 - \$85,000

Women's ➡ Bible

Forged by Fire Services strives to actively make known the love of Jesus Christ through its actions and words by providing warm meals, bottled water, and spiritual care to people in times of need following a disaster or economic downturn. They pray with those in need and offer resources such as devotionals and Bibles. This grant will allow the purchase of a mobile, self-contained kitchen trailer unit to provide meals in communities affected by disaster. Over 130,000 meals have been served in the Gulf Coast region. The mobile kitchen will benefit smaller communities in need that are often overlooked by larger organizations. When serving, Forged by Fire Services strives to connect local LCMS congregations within the communities and shares the mercy and grace of Christ, one plate of food at a time.

Women's Bible Study plans to meet Wednesdays, March 6th and March 20th, 9:30-10:45 in the old basement parish hall. All women are welcome to join us. We watch a video of a Bible lesson, read it in the Bible, and discuss what we learned.

The Neighborhood Service Center, which includes the Food Shelf, is feeding more families than ever from the food shelf. On average about 20 families a day are coming in for food. The most needed items are cereal and ramen noodles. The Board of Stewardship has placed collection boxes by the church entries for your donation to those individuals needing our support.

The Waseca Area Neighborhood Service Center is home to the Waseca Area Food Shelf. In 2023 the Food Shelf helped provide food to 7669 individuals and distributed 137,265 pounds of food. Supplying the families that face insecurity with healthy food options would not be possible without the generous support of donors. The Waseca Food Shelf is so thankful for the Board of Stewardship's food collection boxes by the church entries. Needs are many - but items like ramen noodles, soup, and canned fruit are always in short supply. Cash or checks are also appreciated as monetary donations are used to obtain items through Food Bank suppliers that are able to purchase

food at a reduced cost. All monetary donations are tax deductible. A receipt is supplied for tax purposes at the end of the year. Checks should be made out to the Waseca Area Neighborhood Service Center (or WANSC) with the memo stating: Food Shelf. A tax receipt can be given for cash donations also if you provide your name and mailing address. Member of Thrivent? You can donate to the Food Shelf through Thrivent Choice online as well. Thank you for your continued support!

Are you in need of transportation to appointments or to the store? Are you able to drive someone to an appointment or to the store?? If you fit into either of these categories, please call the church office so, we can help you coordinate the rides that you may need.
