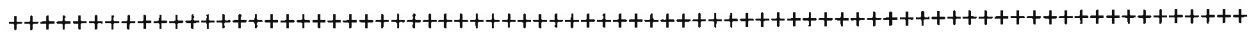

A Note from Pastor Grannis

Greetings in the name of our all-sufficient Lord and Savior Jesus Christ,

In Christ we have nothing to lose. We who are in Christ are to live through faith as those who have nothing to lose. Why? Because in Christ we truly have been given all of the gifts of the new creation. We are coheirs with Him of that life (in the world to come) which has no end. Even now, we live in the moment as those whose future hopes are present with us through faith in Jesus. Our forever life has already begun. We have nothing to fear, nothing greater to gain, and nothing to lose. Yes, Christ Jesus is all-sufficient.

Jesus conveyed this same sentiment with some words that may be a bit hard for us to hear. In the 14th chapter of St Luke's account of the Gospel we hear these words of Jesus:

If anyone comes to me and does not hate his own father and mother and wife and children and brothers and sisters, yes, and even his own life, he cannot be my disciple. Whoever does not bear his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple. For which of you, desiring to build a tower, does not first sit down and count the cost, whether he has enough to complete it? Otherwise, when he has laid a foundation and is not able to finish, all who see it begin to mock him, saying, 'This man began to build and was not able to finish.' Or what king, going out to encounter another king in war, will not sit down first and deliberate whether he is able with ten thousand to meet him who comes against him with twenty thousand? And if not, while the other is yet a great way off, he sends a delegation and asks for terms of peace. So therefore, any one of you who does not renounce all that he has cannot be my disciple. (Luke 14:26-33)

Hating my family to be Christ's disciple? Taking up my cross to follow Jesus? Renouncing all that I have? What is that all about? Well, in short it all boils down to what I stated already above. Jesus is all-sufficient. He is of primary importance. Nothing else compares with Him or should compete with Him – not our family or other earthly loyalties, not our pride or desire for self-preservation – nothing in our lives should even compare to our devotion to Christ. Nothing in our lives should keep us from boldly proclaiming our thankfulness and praise. Nothing and nobody should stop us from serving or obeying our Savior. This is what the life of being a disciple is. Are you up for it? No. But with the help of the Holy Spirit, Christ will guide you on the way.

Christ calls us to this disciple way of life each day, and yet He knows that we have failed and will fail in big and little ways each day. It was true for the Old Testament followers of God; it was true for the first disciples of Christ in the New Testament. We see it depicted time and time again in the Scriptures – the failures of the people of God. But we should not lose hope, nor should we stop striving to live this life of being “all in” – the life that Jesus has called us to. Yes, we are to push on each day with joy and humble thanksgiving, trusting in the cross of Christ – in Jesus' all-sufficient faithfulness – to cover all of our weaknesses, shortcomings and failures. We have nothing to lose. May we give our all, and all that we are, in response to the all-sufficient love of Christ Jesus our faithful Savior. Amen.

* A great way to begin and end the day is with a little routine including Luther's morning and evening prayers. They are found in Luther's Small Catechism in the "Daily Prayers" section (pg. 327 in our LSB hymnal). You can use them as part of your daily devotion as you begin and end each day in God's Word and in prayer.

Luther's Morning Prayer

In the morning when you get up, make the sign of the holy cross and say:

In the name of the Father and of the ✠ Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Then, kneeling or standing, repeat the [Apostles'] Creed and the Lord's Prayer. If you choose, you may also say this little prayer:

I thank You, my heavenly Father, through Jesus Christ, Your dear Son, that you have kept me this night from all harm and danger; and I pray that You would keep me this day also from sin and every evil, that all my doings in life may please You. For into Your hands I commend myself, my body and soul, and all things. Let Your holy angel be with me, that the evil foe may have no power over me. Amen.

Luther's Evening Prayer

In the evening when you go to bed, make the sign of the holy cross and say:

In the name of the Father and of the ✠ Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Then, kneeling or standing, repeat the [Apostles'] Creed and the Lord's Prayer. If you choose, you may also say this little prayer:

I thank You, my heavenly Father, through Jesus Christ, Your dear Son, that You have graciously kept me this day; and I pray that You would forgive me all my sins where I have done wrong, and graciously keep me this night. For into Your hands I commend myself, my body and soul, and all things. Let Your holy angel be with me, that the evil foe may have no power over me. Amen.

Hymn of the Month: A Mighty Fortress Is Our God

Background ~ information from *Lutheran Service Book: Companion to the Hymns*

This most well-known of Luther's hymns is often thought of as "the battle hymn of the Reformation," but Luther thought of it quite differently. He referred to it as "a hymn of comfort." It was written as a reflection on Psalm 46 – especially flowing out of Psalm 46:1 – *God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble.*

Written sometime between 1527 and 1529, Luther and his countrymen had many and great reasons to seek God's comfort. An epidemic of the plague had come to Wittenberg and much of the country. From outside of the Holy Roman Empire, Turkish armies posed a serious threat to the border regions of the German lands. From within, Catholic armies brought additional serious threats against Luther and his growing base of supporters. However, more than mere physical attack, Luther was on the one hand being condemned by the Pope and his theologians, and on the other hand being mocked or having his teachings twisted by the radical Reformers. All the while Luther was regularly suffering from serious physical illness, and emotional distress.

It is known that when Luther was at Coburg, waiting on news from the Diet of Augsburg, he would often sing this hymn (perhaps even daily) in order to redirect his anxieties and woes toward comfort and strength in Christ and His might. The tune and rhythm of *LSB 656* is Luther's own musical composition, while the tune of *LSB 657* is taken from J. S. Bach's reworking of Luther's hymn.

Text Study

In the first half of stanza one, Luther paraphrases Psalm 46:1 (see above). From there however, the rest of the hymn sees beyond the letter of the Scriptures to the spiritual interpretation revealed in Christ. While the threats to body and life are real and many (wars, disease, injury, etc.), our true battle is not against flesh and blood, but against the "old evil foe" – the devil and his evil forces. He comes against us with serious and evil intent, armed with all of his "guile and great might." We end the verse lamenting that nobody on earth is able to match or resist the power of the devil. If Luther had stopped there, then we would be left in utter despair, helpless against the devil's cruel will. But thanks be to God, Luther continues the thought in the following stanza. There he helps us to see that we have not been abandoned by God to the cruel will of the devil.

Stanza two picks up where one left off, confessing that if we were to rely on our own might, we could do nothing against the devils powers. The effect of all of our striving against our "old evil foe," would be a quick and total loss (loss of everything and everyone we have, even our very lives and immortal souls). But God

has “elected” and sent forth a “valiant One” to fight for us. Who is it, you ask? Jesus Christ, Lord of Sabaoth (the strong army of holy angels). Christ is Himself the one and only God; He is with us and fights for us (*Psalms 46:7*). The devil and all his great might is not even worth comparing to the almighty power of God. Yes, Christ has eternal and absolute power over the field of battle.

Trusting in Christ’s eternal victory over the power of the devil, in stanza three Luther then invites us to imagine the most terrifying of scenarios. What if the world became overrun with devils, and all of them were trying to devour us (*1 Peter 5:8*). Luther’s answer in German says, “We will not fear so much, for we shall succeed!” No matter how terrifyingly and fiercely the devil tries to intimidate us, he cannot truly harm us. Why not? Because “*He’s judged! The deed is done!*” (*John 19:30*). When Christ died upon the cross, the battle against sin and the devil was won, and when Christ rose from death, the victory over death was confirmed. That redemptive moment is what all of the prophets and faithful people of old (from Adam to John the Baptist) looked forward to, and that is the moment that all of the Apostles and faithful people of the New Testament era (from the thief on the cross to you and me) find true comfort in. Hence forth, “*one little word can*” defeat and bring the devil down.

The Word which defeats the devil and all his might, “*they shall let remain*” (or more literally, “*they shall let the Word stand*”). They have no power to remove the proclamation of Christ from the earth. They may chase after it, and war against it, but it will not be silenced. It is the Word of Christ; the Word of forgiveness, resurrection, and eternal life in His name. The devils and his fallen angels hate it and have no thanks for it, because it is not for them, but only for humanity and all of the rest of fallen creation which God had originally placed under our authority (*Genesis 1:28; Romans 8:18-39*).

Therefore, we have every reason in any and all circumstances – even the most sorrowful – to nevertheless be at rest and find great comfort in Christ. “*He’s by our side* (on the field of battle) *with His good gifts and Spirit.*” No matter what God allows the devil to take from us in this temporal world, we need never doubt the love of God for us, or the victory that is ours through Christ Jesus our Lord. (*Job 1:6 – 2:10; Job 19:23-27*) We need but only remember what God was willing to do and indeed has done for us in Jesus Christ, who left the joys of heaven for us, who became mortal man for us, who died on the cross for us and who rose in victory for us; all for our salvation (*Philippians 2:5-11; Nicene Creed, 2nd article*). Yes, “*Our victory has been won*” and God’s Kingdom remains ours (*Romans 8:16-17*). Now that Word brings true and lasting comfort!



This month we read about some of the sacrifices God commanded in the Old Testament. The priests who performed those sacrifices pointed to the Perfect High Priest Who was to come – Jesus Christ. The sacrificial lambs pointed to Christ the Lamb of God Who took away the sins of the world (Leviticus 1:10-13; John 1:29). The shed blood was an “atonement cover” for the sins of God’s people which pointed forward to the blood Christ would shed on the cross which would truly cleanse sinners from their sins (Leviticus 1:4; Hebrews 9:11-26; I John 1:7). Blood and water were agents of cleansing from sin in the Old Testament. In water (Baptism) and in blood (the Blood of the Lord’s Supper) Christ sinners are still cleansed from sin today (Numbers 19: 1-22; Matthew 26: 26-29; Acts 8: 36-39). May these Scripture readings help you grow in your understanding of Christ’s sacrificial death for your salvation.

Operation Christmas Child Boxes Delivered to Suriname

This year, our boxes were shipped to small country I had not heard of – the country of Suriname in South America. Suriname, officially the Republic of Suriname, is a country in northern South America, also considered as part of the Caribbean and the West Indies. Situated slightly north of the equator, over 90% of its territory is covered by rainforest, the highest proportion of forest cover in the world. Suriname is bordered by the Atlantic Ocean to the north, French Guiana to the east, Guyana to the west, and Brazil to the south. It is the smallest country in South America by both population and territory. The predominant religion in Suriname is Christianity, which accounts for about 48.4% of the population, followed by Hinduism at 22.3% and Islam at 13.9%. Valentine's toy and school supply clearance is a great time to shop for the children of Operation Christmas Child. Small toys and games, trinkets, jewelry, cups/water bottles and craft/school supplies are perfect items for ages 2-14, for both boys and girls. (No liquids, pastes, glue, putty, gels, dough or slime of any kind. No candy, gum, toothpaste or soap. Also, no toy guns or military items.) Items may be brought to church anytime throughout the year; we will store them for packing shoeboxes in the fall. Monetary donations to the Sunday School account cover the cost of the \$10 shipping fee per box; it takes \$2000 to ship 200 boxes. Thank you!
