

During the Polka Evening Service in October, I shared with the congregation, a true incident that happened during WW1. It was later called the Christmas Armistice. It happened on December 24, 1914.

The event took place in France on Christmas Eve, along a trench warfare line of 500 miles. On one side were the English soldiers and the other side were the German soldiers. It started with the English singing Christmas Carols from their trench. This was proceeded by the German responding with their own Christmas songs. This was followed by the Germans putting lit Christmas Trees on the top of their trenches. With that, men from both sides broke ranks and began to climb out trenches and fraternize with each other. Gifts of food and drink were exchanged. Someone produced a soccer ball and soon an impromptu game was being played. The Germans claimed a 3-2 victory.

There were some humorous times. The Germans asked the English to sing with them. To which the English replied, it would kill them if they did. This was countered by the Germans telling the English their singing alone would be enough to kill the Germans!

The secular world put the reason for the unplanned armistice as one of the following:

- 1. Men began to develop sympathy for their opponents, who were having as miserable a time as they were.
- 2. Men could see civilization in the surroundings.
- 3. Up to that point, the hatred had not progressed to the point as bad as when the war ended.
- 4. There was a desire to see the enemy close.

From a pastor's point of view, I see the rational for the armistice events as less logical and more faith based. I believe the cease fire began as people started to experience the narrative of the birth of Christ as told through song. This narrative, would have caused the hearts of men to soften to the point where they could forgive the atrocities trench warfare brings. One of the greatest teachings of Christ, given as he was escorted to the cross, was to forgive his enemies, "for they know not what they do." For one day, the world was able to experience Jesus instead of this horrible World War. For one day, the men turned to forgiveness. For one day the fighting stopped and good will among men resumed. Just as the angel predicted to the shepherds: And in the same region there were shepherds out in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. And an angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were filled with great fear. And the angel said to them, "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. And this will be a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger." And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased!" This narrative has the power to stop the fighting and bring peace. Whether it was one evening in France 1914 or the political conflicts in America 2022.

### Mites for Missions: LWML Mites at work:

When you hear the phrase "seminary tuition assistance," what's the first location that enters your mind? Did you think of St. Louis, Missouri, home of Concordia Seminary? Perhaps you thought of Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne, Indiana.

Did you know that there are *seventeen* Lutheran seminaries on the continent of Africa, providing pastoral training to the *eight* partner church bodies of The Lutheran Church--Missouri Synod? Our own Minnesota South LWML Mission Grant #13, Nigerian Seminary Tuition Assistance, already fully funded for the 2022-24 biennium, recently provided tuition aid to the largest of these seminaries, Jonathan Ekong Memorial Lutheran Seminary in Obot Idim, Nigeria.

"Jonathan Ekong Memorial Lutheran Seminary's primary mission is to train pastors and evangelists for the Lutheran Church of Nigeria and other confessional Lutheran churches in Africa," begins the description on the website of the Lutheran Church of Nigeria (LCN). "These men are equipped to serve God's people with the Word and Sacraments and to lead the Church in reaching out to the lost and uncommitted with the good news of life and salvation in Jesus Christ."

That sounds a lot like our American LCMS seminaries, doesn't it? Perhaps one of the largest differences lies in the circumstances in which Nigerian seminary students find themselves. Listen to these words from Rev. Dr. Christian Ekong, President and Archbishop of the LCN: "The kidnapping, banditry, herder's clashes, and Boko-Haram attacks are still threatening. The National Universities in Nigeria have been closed down for about 8 months now. University professors have decided not to return to classes until their salaries are paid and facilities are improved for conducive learning. It is a very difficult time for our nation! We suffer from poor and ineffective leadership."

Boko-Haram is a Sunni Muslim group associated with jihad, who seeks to overthrow the current Nigerian government. "Boko-Haram" literally means "Western education is forbidden," and the seminaries are just as susceptible to these attacks as the national universities.

It almost sounds hopeless, doesn't it? But keep reading: "Your support for the training of our seminarians at this time is very comforting. It is an added strength to our administration, which I am not taking for granted. I greatly appreciate your kindness for our seminary and the church. Your mission endeavors will continue to receive our Lord's rewards." These words, from an email sent on October 7, are filled with the joy of the Lord. "Kindly extend our gratitude to the women of the LWML," says Rev. Dr. Ekong. Your mites are making a difference! Never doubt that your efforts are worth it, whether it be an extra offering on LWML Sunday, a collection basket at your fall rally, or even the change you dig out of your purse, pocket, or car seats.

For your name's sake, O LORD, preserve my life! In your righteousness bring my soul out of trouble! And in your steadfast love you will cut off my enemies, and you will destroy all the adversaries of my soul, for I am your servant (Psalm 143:11-12).
