Epiphany is a season during the Christian Church year. The name Epiphany comes from the Greek **epiphaneia**, meaning "appearance" or "manifestation," and refers to the revelation of Jesus Christ to the world. If you follow scripture, you will discover when Jesus made these appearances. Below are some of the ones I like to focus on:

- Jesus appeared to the shepherds as a new born baby boy. Saint Luke records the angels announced the event as "the shepherds keeping watch over their sheep in the field." Upon hearing this message, they ran to see the baby who would be King. I'm sure the next day they would have tried to share this good news to their neighbors and relatives. But they would have discovered people questioning their story. The messiah born into poverty? Born in a stable? The people would have struggled with the shepherd's story because they expected the Messiah to be a mighty king.
- 2. The second time Jesus appeared was to Simeon and Anna, when Jesus was dedicated at the temple. Again, the people, upon hearing prophecy from these two, would have rejected them as simply unbelievable. Like the shepherd's story, their story was interesting, but rejected because Mary and Joseph were considered too poor to be parents of the Messiah.
- 3. The third time Jesus appears is when He is twelve years old. This time He stays behind the group His parents are with. And so, for five days He is at the temple questioning the teachers of His time. He offers both questions and answers that impress the teachers with His understanding. The culture at the time would have questioned a child's knowledge and considered He probably just had a good instructor.
- 4. As an adult His revelation continues as he performs a miracle at a wedding in Cana. At His instruction the servants pour water into 30-gallon jugs. The water is turned into wine. This impressed the servants and disciples since only they knew where the wine came from. At this point, Jesus had not announced He was the Messiah. However, the servants who witnessed the miracle would have questioned among themselves who He was. Perhaps He was a prophet? Perhaps a magician? The thought of Jesus as the Messiah, would not have occurred to them.
- 5. Last Sunday we studied how Jesus was revealed in His hometown of Nazareth. These are people He grew up with. They knew His mother, brothers, and sisters. When He announced that He was the one who Isaiah was speaking of, they rejected Him and wanted to kill Him. Probably thinking how could someone from Nazareth even think of such things. Messiahs do not come from our small town. Messiahs are not someone we have grown up with.
- 6. As Jesus continued His mission to spread the good news, that He was the Messiah. People began to take notice that Jesus could do things that only God could do. He raised the dead and healed the sick. He showed that He even had authority over demons. People were astounded as they witnessed these miracles unfold before their very eyes. This caused multitudes to come to Him. Strangely while the people loved his miracles and teachings, they just could not grasp the idea that He was the Messiah. In our present day, many suffer with the same thinking. Yes, Jesus is a good teacher but they have trouble putting their trust in Him as a Messiah. As Christians we need to announce to the world the good news boldly. That Jesus is a good teacher, but more importantly, He is the Messiah. He is both God and man. Finally, He is to be trusted as our hope. His promises are true. Only He reconciles us back to God our Father. Only He forgives our sins.

Thank you to everyone who assisted with the Children's Christmas Worship! We were blessed to have you involved. And to the children – we were blessed to hear you share your faith and help lead us in worship.

Operation Christmas Child - Shop Christmas Clearance

As you shop the Christmas clearance and deals, remember the children of Operation Christmas Child. Sales are a great time to pick up small toys and games, trinkets, jewelry, plain T shirts, and craft supplies that can go in the shoeboxes next November. Items for ages 2-14, for both boys and girls, are collected throughout the year. (No liquids, pastes, glue, putty, dough or slime of any kind. No toy guns or military items.) Items can be stored in a locked room at church. Thank you!

Operation Christmas Child Update

Thank you to everyone who donated items and helped pack on packing day. Thank you also to those who gave toward the shipping cost (\$10 per box; over \$2260 total). St. Paul Church Sunday School students, youth and adults packed 226 shoeboxes! What a blessing! St Paul Lutheran Church was also the Drop Off Location for our area and we took in 840 Shoeboxes from area churches and individual families!!! These left Waseca and were driving to Mankato. From there they were shipped to the Distribution Center in Minneapolis where they were inspected and mailed out around the world.

St. Paul's purchased shipping labels through the Shoebox website for tracking. This year, our boxes were sent to two countries in Africa. Namibia is located in southern Africa, bordering the South Atlantic Ocean. It is home to the world's largest population of free-roaming cheetahs and rhinos. The people of Namibia consist of at least 11 ethnic groups. Zambia is located in central southern Africa. Nearly a third of the country consists of national wildlife parks. A majority of the population lives in urban areas. There are nearly 70 different ethnicities and languages in the country, where English is the official language along with seven regional languages.

Please pray - for the workers delivering the boxes and for the children in Namibia and Zambia receiving the shoeboxes and others around the world. After receiving a box, each child is invited to attend Bible study in their community. We pray the Holy Spirit uses these gifts of love in amazing ways to share the salvation found only in Jesus.

Next year, boxes will continue to be available for you to take home, fill, and return with shipping funds of \$10 per box. You are welcome to use items from the Shoebox storage room to complete your box. The hope is we will have a more manageable number of boxes for our small Sunday School to pack. Thank you!

For so the Lord has commanded us, saying, "I have made you a light for the Gentiles, that you may bring salvation to the ends of the earth" (Acts 13:47).

We are in the darkest time of year. How has it affected you? Perhaps with electric lighting and a few extra candles or bright decorations around the house, you've barely noticed. But studies have shown that reduced daylight hours can affect our health adversely. I'm no medical doctor, but a quick internet search can find countless articles by knowledgeable professionals describing how winter takes its toll on energy levels, appetite, sleep, and even mood. If that sounds all too familiar, know that you are not alone!

Praise be to God that Jesus, the Light of the world, came into our darkness. This is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you, that God is light, and in him is no darkness at all. If we say we have fellowship with him while we walk in darkness, we lie and do not practice the truth. But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin (1 John 1:5-7). That the blood of Jesus cleanses us from sin is the source of all our hope and joy! And... it is our true source of Light.

Brighter than any candle, our mission grants are received by ministries who long to help people lost in the darkness of sin and unbelief. When you faithfully contribute your mites, week after week, month after month, and year after year, those ministries shine the Light of Christ into this darkness and all its adverse effects.

- As a victim of domestic abuse wonders how she and her son will survive, an ad for The Dwelling Place pops up on her computer screen, and there is light. As she is welcomed into her first Bible study with the caring staff at her transitional home, there shines the Light of Christ.
- As a rural Kazakh farmer faces financial hardship and wonders how long he can go on, he hears that a missionary has planted a new church near his ancestral home in western Mongolia, and there is hope. As he attends his first worship service, where he hears about the grace and mercy of Jesus, the Light of Christ shines in his heart.
- As a teenager faces severe depression, ready to drop out of school for good, a neighbor mentions that the local Lutheran high school offers scholarships for tuition assistance. Surrounded by praying teachers and peers, this student finds joy in daily chapel and great comfort in hearing of Jesus' love and forgiveness every day. Where there was darkness, the student has found the Light of Christ.

Countless similar stories could be told, and indeed will be. As you continue to read updates from each of our mission grant recipients, be encouraged that your prayerfully donated mites are reaching those in darkness with the light of God's Word and His sacraments. And let us not grow weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up. So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to everyone, and especially to those who are of the household of faith (Galatians 6:9-10).

In the meantime, soak up whatever daylight you can, knowing that God has ordered our days and seasons for His good purposes in our lives. May your heart feel "lighter" knowing that brighter days are just around the corner as our calendar pages turn toward spring once again. And may your ultimate joy be firmly grounded in the hope of eternal life in the presence of Jesus, won FOR YOU by His death and resurrection. And the city has no need of sun or moon to shine on it, for the glory of God gives it light, and its lamp is the Lamb (Revelation 21:23). 

This basic question of faith remains the same today as in generations past.
